100 New Dementia Champions Graduate!

On 14th March 2012 the first cohort of Dementia Champions graduated at a ceremony at Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh.

Congratulated by Nicola Sturgeon, the Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary

for Health and Wellbeing, they are the first of 300 to be trained for an important role within acute hospitals. A highlight at the ceremony was a short film showing clips of some of the Champions describing the

programme, what they had learned from the experience and their plans for taking their learning forward and sharing it with colleagues.

These new champions will be 'change agents' who will work together with people with dementia, their families and carers and their staff teams to make sure that their experience in hospital is a positive one.

Evaluation of the course has shown, in general, an increase in participant's confidence to be able to deal with legal and ethical issues and to be able to recognise and respond to the impact of the physical, emotional, social and cultural environment in terms of ensuring the rights, choice, identity, and equity for people with dementia in acute hospital settings.

The University of the West of Scotland in partnership with Alzheimer's Scotland were commissioned to deliver this programme and will continue to provide this training to a further 200 **Dementia Champions** including staff from NHS acute general hospitals and social services staff. The first day of the new session for the second cohort was held at the University of the West of

Scotland in May 2012, with an action packed conference day featuring presentations from a range of speakers. The atmosphere was electric with anticipation and some new recruits described their feelings about the months ahead as "excited", and "inspired by the passion in the air today". The 3rd cohort will begin their training in October 2012.



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Promoting Excellence in Dementia Care

Phase 1 of the programme involved the development of Promoting Excellence; A framework for all health and social services staff working with people with dementia, their families and carers which was launched by the Cabinet Secretary Nicola Sturgeon alongside the 'Standards of Care for Dementia in Scotland' in June 2011.

At the heart of the framework is a drive to improve the quality of life for people with dementia and this is reflected in a number of Quality of Life Outcome Indicators which are mapped

against the 'Standards of Care for Dementia in Scotland'.

The Promoting Excellence Framework covers four levels of knowledge and skills for all health social services staff. specific to the worker's



role in relation to demen-

The framework also reflects the different knowledge and skills that staff should have throughout the stages of the journey for people with dementia and their families and car-

The framework also informed the development a strategic Dementia Workforce Development Plan. This is being implemented during Phase 2 throughout 2012 and 2013 and involves development of a range of resources, activities and infrastructure.

'Informed about Dementia-Improving Practice'

'Informed about Dementia: improving practice' is an educational DVD for the



entire health and social services workforce in Scotland. It will support staff to develop the knowledge and skills described in the *Dementia Informed* level of Promoting Excellence. It has been fully endorsed by **Alzheimer Scotland** and the **Scottish Dementia Working Group**, the national campaigning group run for and by people with dementia.


The DVD contains a number of chapters covering a range of topics which are addressed through scenarios and film clips of people with dementia talking about their experiences. It also includes opportunities for viewers to engage in learning activities.

'Dementia Skilled – Improving Practice'

This learning resource has been developed for people who work directly with people with dementia, their families and carers. It will support staff to develop the knowledge and skills set out at the *Dementia Skilled* Level of Promoting Excellence. The resource is designed

particularly for the health and social services workforce, but may be valuable to other groups working in related services or organisations. It can be used for individual learning, learning as a group or team, in a facilitated learning event or in a mixture of all of these approaches.



As 'Dementia Skilled-Improving Practice' is particularly relevant to key groups of social care staff in care homes, care at home and adult day care, an associated guidance pack has also been developed. The pack will support assessors, educators, trainers and managers to use the resource to maximum effect. The guidance identifies the alignment between the Dementia Skilled resource and current National Occupational Standards (NOS) in Health and Social Care, the Professional Development Award in Dementia Skilled Practice and the Continuous Learning Framework. OTHER DEVELOPMENTS

Dementia Leaders across Scotland

Alzheimer Scotland Dementia Nurse Consultants and Specialists are to be appointed to every Health Board across Scotland.
Alzheimer Scotland and the Scottish Government have also supported Allied Health Professional Dementia Consultant posts. These leaders will provide expert strategic

and operational leadership, consultancy, direction and guidance to all partners involved in the design, development and delivery of services and support for people with dementia. To support them in their role, a NES development programme, Promoting Excellence in Dementia Leadership began in February 2012 and will be completed in January 2013.

Other training initiatives

- 74 staff attended a Palliative Care in Dementia
 Training for Trainers Programme
- 37 staff trained in Post Diagnostic Support.

In focus in our next issue:

Psychological support for people with dementia and their families and carers

The emotional and psychological impact of a diagnosis of dementia can be profound. As part of the aim to improve quality of life for people with dementia and their families and carers the work programme includes initiatives that can help staff to develop their skills in promoting emotional and psychological well being.

Training has included:

- 116 health, social services and third sector staff trained in Cognitive Stimulation Therapy
- 18 qualified psychological therapists trained

in Acceptance and Commitment Therapy for carers of people with dementia

 16 health and social services staff completed Training for Trainers in Psychological Interventions for Stress and Distress

Developments in Social Services

The size, scale and diversity of the social services sector present particular challenges to implementing the Dementia Workforce Development Plan and embedding Promoting Excellence. In order to ensure wide reach and build capacity within the workforce 50 half day workshops were held across Scotland during February and March

2012, reaching almost 800 participants from the public, private and third sector. The purpose of these workshops was to engage with local service providers; raise awareness of and provide an overview of Promoting Excellence; and to harness existing national and local networks. 100 Ambassadors have also been recruited within Social services to take this work forward.

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
